MAJOR RESEARCH AND PRACTICE INTERESTS:

My research is grounded in three public health domains: social epidemiology, prevention science, and psychiatric epidemiology. My studies focus on two major areas: (1) violent, traumatic experiences and the ways that they affect children and youth, and (2) the social context of high-risk behaviors among adolescents (the latter often being sequelae of the first.) One of my main areas of expertise is multilevel methods, where I utilize neighborhood-level analyses for insight into both etiology and prevention strategies. Using both quantitative and qualitative methods, my most recent work, strongly influenced by Bronfenbrenner's Bioecological Theory of Human Development, has focused on identifying neighborhood-level resources that can be mobilized to decrease levels of violence both in families and in communities. I have recently been supported by a five-year K01 career development award from NICHD, enabling me to gain experience in prevention science and community-based participatory research. This work has led to active collaborations with the Boston Public Health Commission, the Boston Public Schools, and the Boston Police Department, among others, to develop coordinated responses to traumatized youth. Consequently, I am well poised to collaborate with communities in the development, evaluation, and dissemination of efficacious, preventive, multilevel interventions to prevent child abuse and neglect, youth violence, and other types of violence, and their mental health and behavioral consequences, as well as to continue my basic research on the causes and consequences of violence exposure among children and adolescents.
