#### **LOCATION**

##### **VISITING BOSTON**

The workshop will be conducted at the Harvard School of Public Health in Boston, Massachusetts, located in the Longwood/Harvard Medical Campus (LMA). The School is a short walk from other schools, Fenway Park, and several of Boston's renowned museums. Boston offers world-class shopping and sightseeing, and is a popular vacation destination. June temperatures are between 75°-85° (23°-32°C) in the day and 65°-75° (19°-23°C) at night.

##### **TRANSPORTATION**

There are many means of transportation from Logan Airport to your accommodation. The most common are taxi or public transportation.

#### **Taxi Service from Logan Airport**

Boston taxis are available at Logan terminals 24 hours a day and provide service to all of New England. All areas within a 12-mile radius of downtown Boston are charged a metered rate. Beyond the 12-mile radius the charge is a flat rate. The rates for taxi service from Logan to area hotels range from \$20.00 - \$30.00.

#### **Public Transportation (MBTA)**

The subway and bus routes serving Boston Logan International Airport are operated by the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA). From Logan, take an "E" train on the Green Line to the Brigham Circle stop. This will bring you to Harvard School of Public Health. Purchase a one-trip ticket (\$2.00) , 1 day pass for unlimited travel on subway/local bus (\$9.00), or a 7 day pass for unlimited travel on subway/local bus (\$15.00)
