In the Spotlight:

Francine Laden has been awarded the International Society for Environmental Epidemiology (ISEE) John Goldsmith Award for outstanding contributions to the field of environmental epidemiology. Congratulations, Francine! This is a huge and well-deserved honor. Francine will be giving the Goldsmith Award keynote address at ISEE's annual conference in Taiwan next month. Tamarra James-Todd will also be giving a keynote address, which is titled "Racial disparities in personal care products and environmental endocrine disrupting chemicals." I know many are not able to travel to Taiwan for the conference this year, but I hope you will join virtually to watch Francine and Tamarra's addresses. Visit the ISEE website here to register.

I also want to highlight two important reports published this week. The World Health Organization (WHO) published their review of 193 national climate plans (NDCs) and 53 long-term climate strategies (LT-LEDS) in the world. WHO reported many improvements in the NDCs since their last review, including increases in considering large health benefits, COVID-19 recovery, and air pollutions targets. This was also the first time WHO looked at LT-LEDS, and they were found to have even stronger links to health than NDCs. Read the full report here. And the Air Quality Life Index (AQLI) published their annual report, which maintains that air pollution is the greatest risk to human health—reducing the average person's life expectancy by 2.3 years. Department Updates:

Call for Faculty Input: Through ORSD, the school wants to identify high-value and/or frequently used datasets at the School-level that could be targeted for better coordinated sharing where possible. I strongly encourage our primary faculty to complete this 5 minute survey so that your voice is heard, and the school directs its resources to best meet your needs.

This spring, the Environmental Justice Student Organization and the Environmental Law Society are joining forces to host a half-day conference on environmental justice, thanks to the support of the Salata Student Organization Funding Program. Our very own master's student, Jinia Sarkar, who also serves as the Co-President of the EJSO, will be leading the charge on the EJ front. This is a fantastic opportunity to get involved and make a difference in our community. If you're inspired by their initiative, why not consider applying for funding from the Salata Institute? EH in the News

- Montana's Water Woes: A recent article from US News discusses the efforts being made in Montana to remove lead from school drinking water. The article highlights the challenges faced by the state, including issues with funding and data collection, which continue to prevent children from accessing clean drinking water. EH Instructor Ronnie Levin is quoted in the article, stating that while the current budget is not ideal, it is sufficient to add filters to all school faucets. Any steps taken to reduce exposure—even if they are not perfect solutions—are better than nothing. You can read the full article here to learn more about this important issue.
- A Foggy Finding: Marc Weisskopf, Professor of Environmental Epidemiology and Physiology, spoke with YahooNews recently about a new study revealing the 'large' effect that air pollution may have on cognitive health. Marc, along with other Harvard Chan researchers, conducted an analysis of 14 prior studies to conclude that chronic exposure to polluted air containing fine particulate matter increases risk of dementia and Alzheimer's disease. - Prioritize School Building Infrastructure: Joe Allen was quoted in two New York Times articles on the condition of HVAC systems in American schools. Climate change, extreme heat, and poor ventilation make learning difficult for students and pose health threats to students and teachers. Joe talks about the need to update schools' HVAC systems. Tracking Heat-Related Deaths: A new article from WBUR News highlights the importance of tracking heat-related deaths—discussing how many cities across the country greatly underestimate the number of people who die annually from extreme heat. Francesca Dominici, Professor of Biostatistics and EH Faculty Affiliate, chimes in to emphasize how this lack of accurate and consistent information makes it challenging to know whether community and government efforts to address heat resiliency are working. Weekly Policy Snippets:

o **Gifts for Employees and Non-Employees:** Harvard threshold for gifts to employees and non-employees is \$100. This is because Harvard must follow the Internal Revenue Code (IRS) section 132(a) (4) for de minimis benefits. The IRS defines items with a value exceeding \$100 not to be de minimis; thus, considered taxable. What does the \$100 include? The \$100 threshold includes all charges including engraving or monogramming, taxes, and delivery fees to

the recipient's home or other off-campus location. The \$100 is inclusive of all gifts per event and is applied University-wide. Shipping or mailing charges for gifts delivered to Harvard and expenses for wrapping paper and cards are considered incidental expenses and do not need to be included in the \$100 threshold. Shipping, mailing or delivery charges for gifts sent to the recipient's home or other off-campus locations (i.e., funeral home) must be considered in the \$100 threshold. Department Updates:

I want to share some news from this year's World Conference On Lung Cancer (WCLC), which just finished in Singapore this week. Xinan Wang, one of our postdocs working with David Christiani, received the award of Tobacco Control and Smoking Cessation for Early Career Researcher on her recent work of *Pre-diagnosis smoking cessation on Overall Survival among patients with non-small cell lung cancer*, using the Boston Lung Cancer Survival cohort. Congratulations to Xinan! What a terrific honor!



EH in the News

- o IRA in Action: This week brings encouraging news. A recently released EPA report confirms the Inflation Reduction Act's potential to significantly reduce emissions and expedite our shift from fossil fuels. The report reveals a projected 44% decrease in power sector emissions by 2030, down to 730 million metric tons, compared to 2005 levels. This reaffirms our belief in the IRA's ability to drive climate progress and the critical role of research in assessing the health and environmental impacts of key policies.
- Hair, Health Inequity: I also wanted to take a moment to highlight Marissa Chan, Shivani Parikh, and Derek Shyr, who worked with Professors Gary Adamkiewicz and Tamarra James-Todd on important research recently

featured on WCVB. Looking at the ingredients in hair care products across different neighborhoods in Boston, the group discovered striking disparities in levels of hazardous chemicals, finding that "11.4 percent of hair products sold in Mission Hill contained hazardous chemicals compared to just under 8 percent in Beacon Hill". The group are helping to protect the health of communities facing disproportionate exposure to hazards, and I commend them on this impactful research.

- Shaping Healthy Schools: I am excited to share some recent news featuring the Healthy Building Program's Joe Allen. In a conversation with PBS NewsHour, Joe shed light on how high temperatures have forced schools to either close or dismiss early in at least nine states last week. It's raised questions about old, overheated buildings, the lack of air conditioning, and bigger ventilation concerns tied to COVID-19. Joe's expertise helps us understand the challenges we face in creating healthy and safe environments for our children and communities. Please join me in congratulating him on his impactful work and watch the full interview here.
- Lead Pipes: The Boston Globe included some no-nonsense quotes from Ronnie Levin about the recent issues regarding removing lead pipes in Massachusetts. It's important to have these pipes replaced because lead exposure causes developmental problems in children and serious health problems in adults. Federal funding for lead pipe removal in Massachusetts was cut in half this year because of the amount of lead pipes reported on the EPA's survey earlier this year. While the state, the federal government, and the EPA argue about who to blame and how to fix it, Ronnie says the solution is simple and long overdue. I encourage you to read the article and Ronnie's quotes here.
- O Caleb Dresser, ClimateMD: I was thrilled to see research by our own Caleb Dresser featured in a recent Politico article on disaster preparedness and climate resilience. The piece highlighted his ongoing work to aid clinics in responding to climate-driven extreme weather. Caleb's research and expertise in disaster preparedness is helping ensure our vulnerable citizens are protected, even in worst-case scenarios. We are proud to support his efforts to build climate resilience and mitigate risks to human health.

New Resources

 The Department of Environmental Health Sciences at Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health is inviting early-career researchers nationwide to apply for the 2024 Agents of Change Fellowship in Environmental Justice. This 9-month program aims to diversify leadership and amplify marginalized voices in environmental and climate justice. - I am excited to introduce you to a tool that is sure to revolutionize the way we interact with our built environment. The Co-Benefits of the Built Environment (CoBE) tool is a groundbreaking resource designed to help us better understand the impact of building energy consumption. It calculates the greenhouse gas and air pollutant emissions, climate impacts, and public health impacts of building energy use, and allows users to compare these to climate policies. It's an invaluable tool for anyone interested in quantifying health and climate benefits for evidence-based decision-making. EH's own Joseph Allen is the Principal Investigator of the CoBE Project. His experience in conducting health investigations of sick buildings across a diverse range of industries has been instrumental in the tool's development. I encourage all of you to explore CoBE and consider how it might enhance your research and practice. Let's continue to lead the way in environmental health!
- I also encourage students to take advantage of a scholarship opportunity for free attendance at the *NIOSH-funded 2023 Prevention through Design (PtD) Workshop* taking place this Wednesday, the 21st. This event is a fantastic chance for students to learn and engage in a collaborative environment. You can find more details in the Upcoming Events section.

As we wrap up this busy week, I hope those who observed Yom Kippur found their fast manageable and the day provided a meaningful opportunity for reflection and renewal. I also want to congratulate President Claudine Gay on her inauguration today! Her vision and leadership will help guide Harvard forward during these complex times.

Let's also not forget that we have one more speaker today for our Whittenberger Lecture series—don't miss Somini Sengupta in Kresge 202 at 4:00 PM. In the Spotlight:

I'm pleased to share that the Wildland Fire Mitigation and Management Commission (requested by US Congress under the Biden Administration, Dept of Interior, Dept of Agriculture, and FEMA) which I serve on, has released our official report examining wildfire risks and responses. As extreme wildfires become more frequent and intense, this report provides key recommendations to help safeguard communities nationwide. The committee conducted an extensive review process over the past year, gathering input from wildfire experts, officials, and impacted citizens across the country. I'm proud of the diligent work by committee members to synthesize these perspectives into actionable strategies. The report lays out guidance on boosting wildfire resilience through improved land management, hardening infrastructure, advancing detection technologies, bolstering emergency services, and more. We also emphasize the need for better public education around wildfire risks and preparedness. I encourage you all to look at the report. This represents an important roadmap toward evidencebased wildfire policy that protects people, their health, firefighters, homes, land, forests, and wildlife. As wildfires and wildfire smoke/post-damage remain a growing threat, these recommendations will help officials and communities work collaboratively to reduce risks. This was presented to U.S. Congress last week and this week.

There is also one more award to recognize from the ISEE (International Society for Environmental Epidemiology) 2023 meeting in Taiwan! Jie Chen, Postdoctoral Fellow in the Spatial and Contextual Exposomics and Epidemiology (SpaCEE) laboratory, won one of the Student and New Researchers' Abstract Awards for her poster titled: "Association of residential exposure to dioxin emissions with lymphoid malignancies in a prospective US based cohort of women." Congratulations Jie!

This week, we bid farewell to Liz Purchia, C-CHANGE's communications director. In her 5½ years at the center, Liz has worked tirelessly to raise the visibility of the connections between climate and health. In her new role, Liz will be working alongside Gina McCarthy, Bloomberg and their partners to ensure cities, states, businesses, and local organizations are taking full advantage of available federal funds, like the Inflation Reduction Act, to advance our climate goals. We wish her all the success in this new chapter. As the center is undergoing several changes this fall, I

EH in the News

- Health Impacts of High Heat: This week, I'm highlighting the critical work of Barrak Alahmad, a research fellow in the EER (Exposure, Epidemiology and Risk) (Exposure, Epidemiology and Risk) program. Barrak was recently featured in a Wall Street Journal article examining the health impacts of extreme heat on outdoor workers. Through innovative research collaboration in the Persian Gulf, Barrak is uncovering how heat stress affects the body and mind. His findings will be invaluable as we seek solutions to protect our planet's most vulnerable populations from the growing threat of high temperatures. Read more about it here.
- Smog Science: Also in the spotlight this week is Mary Johnson, a valuable new addition to our PI community. Mary recently had her research on air pollution and stroke risk featured in HealthDay. The article highlighted findings from her new study showing links between exposure to fine particulate matter air pollution and higher short-term risks for ischemic stroke. Leveraging detailed data for over 6 million Medicare beneficiaries, Mary and colleagues demonstrated significantly elevated stroke risks in the days after spikes in fine particulate pollution. As Mary noted, the findings reinforce the importance of reducing particulate matter to protect cardiovascular health. Read more here.
 - She was also recently interviewed by City Limits about the health impacts of microplastics, which are becoming alarmingly ubiquitous in

our environment. Through her pioneering work, Mary is elucidating how these tiny plastic particles may negatively affect our bodies. Her findings on issues like inflammation and immune function will be instrumental as we seek solutions to mitigate harm. Read the full interview here.


