

# Chair Chatter October 6, 2023

Happy October! Last week was packed with high-profile talks and events that provided thought-provoking insights on climate change communication and health equity. I want to thank everyone for attending and engaging with our speakers. I also want to thank our amazing staff, especially Jen Razo and Halimat Olunlade, for their work in organizing the speakers.

On Thursday, Dr. Katharine Hayhoe gave an inspirational lecture on communicating climate change through a health lens. She believes clearly conveying the health risks can help people relate to this global crisis on a personal level. However, it's essential to balance discussions of risk with solutions that empower action, so people feel equipped to drive change instead of helpless.

Our two Whittenberger lecturers, Dr. John Balbus and reporter Somini Sengupta, expanded on these themes. Dr. Balbus provided a candid overview of gaps in our health sector that leave vulnerable groups at risk. But he ended optimistically, urging us to address these systemic issues. Somini Sengupta shared valuable lessons on storytelling and spotlighted those most affected by climate change. By humanizing how "compounding hazards" bar the global poor from health even in stable climates, she brought inequality into focus.

I hope you all found last week's lectures as fascinating as I did. These lectures underscored the critical role of effective communication in addressing climate change. They highlighted the need for systemic changes in our health sector and the power of storytelling in bringing to light the lived experiences of those most affected by climate change. Through these talks, we can see how interconnected these themes are and how they collectively contribute to our understanding and response to climate change with solutions that can be quantified.

Last Friday, the entire Harvard community gathered to watch the inauguration of President Claudine Gay. Despite the unfavorable weather, the day was filled with inspiring festivities. In the morning I moderated a panel on climate change with Tamarra James-Todd. There is an urgent need for solutions and multidisciplinary collaboration. This panel was one part of an academic symposium, which addressed the relevant issues of our society that are being discussed across the University. Harvard Magazine published an excellent article that summarizes each of the panels, and I encourage you all to read it <a href="here">here</a>.

In the afternoon, the inauguration festivities began. If you didn't make it to Cambridge, I hope you attended the HSPH livestream viewing party in Kresge. It was a great opportunity to celebrate this momentous occasion with the Harvard community. The ceremony itself was a testament to Harvard's rich history and promising future. As President Gay puts it, "Harvard represents not just a prestigious institution, but a beacon of hope and progress. I see in Harvard the courage to change the world". 

evidence linking them to early onset cancers, environmental toxins like endocrine disruptors, air pollution, and pesticides are carcinogens and not easily avoidable. Carmen and Joel suggest reducing your exposure by avoiding plastics, using air purifiers in your home, and making healthy lifestyle choices. Read the full article <a href="here">here</a>.

• Microplastics and Gut Health: I'm thrilled to highlight recent work by Dr. Philip Demokritou, director of the Center for Nanotechnology and Nanotoxicology, featured in a new article by Environmental Health News. His team has developed methods to simulate aged "weathered" microplastics in the lab and recently demonstrated that exposure can enhance fat absorption in intestinal cells. His research also shows that microplastics trigger inflammation in the gut, which may contribute to a leaky gut linked to many disorders. While microplastics are ubiquitous in our food, water, and air, Dr. Demokritou emphasizes the need for science-based solutions and alternatives to reduce exposures. #### EH in the News

- Football on the Mind: The Harvard Football Players Health Study published an article this week on recent diagnoses of chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE) among former NFL football players. The study, co-authored by Marc Weisskopf (Director of Epidemiological Studies for the Football Players Health Study) examined the association of football exposure, phycological disorders, and other medical conditions to CTE diagnoses. This study is particularly interesting because CTE is a postmortem diagnosis. You can find the full article on PubMed here.
- Health Benefits of Trees: The Inflation Reduction Act has invested a billion dollars to plant more trees in cities across the US. An article from National Geographic discusses the positive changes already being seen in cities that have planted more trees and more broadly the health benefits of trees and nature in cities. The article also quotes Associate Professor Peter James and postdoctoral research fellow Linda Tomasso on the cognitive benefits of exposure to trees. I encourage you all to check out the full article here and read about the many remarkable ways trees make us healthier.
- Harvard Vs. Extreme Heat: I'm thrilled to share that the Climate Health Equity for Community Clinics Program, one of C-CHANGE's newer initiatives, is already making headlines! A recent article on Grist highlights the program's innovative approach to tackling heat-related illnesses. It's wonderful to see our collaboration with Americares and Johnson & Johnson gaining recognition. Let's celebrate this achievement and continue our vital work in public health and climate change. I encourage you all to read the article here.
- Healthier Haircare: I'm proud to share that Tamarra James-Todd has made a
  significant contribution to public health with her research on the dangers of
  some hair relaxers. A Newsweek article featured her findings that these
  products, used mostly by Black women, may contain endocrine-disrupting
  chemicals that can harm their health. Thanks to the advocacy of
  Representatives Ayanna Pressley and Shontel Brown, who raised concerns

about formaldehyde and other toxins in hair products, the FDA is now considering banning these harmful ingredients. Tamarra's work exemplifies how our research can spark change and protect vulnerable communities. I commend her for this impactful achievement and encourage you all to read the article, <u>linked here</u>.
