

Department Updates

2017 Multidisciplinary International Research Training (MIRT) Program

The Harvard Multidisciplinary International Research Training (MIRT) program is a national program designed to encourage underrepresented students to pursue careers in biomedical and behavioral science research careers. The program provides support for undergraduate and graduate students to do research work overseas. This year, we have selected 9 Harvard MIRT fellows from 8 universities across the country.

A two day pre-travel orientation program was held on May 4 and 5, 2017 at the Harvard T. H. Chan School of Public Health campus. This annual pre-travel orientation welcomes our new MIRT fellows and prepares them for their fellowship experience. The orientation provides opportunities to meet fellow MIRT students and program faculty, get important information on travel health, ethical conduct of human research, scientific writing, travel safety, and cultural competency while gaining hands on skills necessary for conducting their own epidemiologic research.

Our MIRT Fellows will be at their research sites in June - August; be participating in research projects and community service in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia; Lima, Peru; and Santiago, Chile this summer.







Global Initiative for Neuropsychiatric Genetics Education in Research (GINGER)

Members of the Global Initiative for Neuropsychiatric Genetics Education in Research (GINGER) team visited GINGER collaborating sites in South and East Africa: Walter Sisulu University campuses in Mthatha & Port Elizabeth, South Africa and Addis Ababa University in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. In South Africa, the team conducted a needs assessment to determine training priorities for Walter Sisulu University students and faculty. In Addis Ababa, GINGER organized and ran a three day R Programming Course from May 23-25. The course was attended by 25 faculty and PhD students from the departments of Psychiatry, Pharmacology and Public Health at Addis Ababa University.

Appointments and Promotions

- Dr. Caroline Buckee was promoted to Associate Professor of Epidemiology. Dr. Buckee's research highlights areas where mathematical models can benefit efforts to control infectious disease that affect the most vulnerable global populations, especially children in low-income settings.
- The Department of Epidemiology has welcomed <u>Dr. Elise</u> Robinson as Assistant Professor of Epidemiology. Dr. Robinson's research is focused on the genetic influences on behavior and cognition. More specifically, the heterogeneity within psychiatric disorders, psychiatric disease risk in the general population, and outcome variation in individuals at high risk for severe mental illness.



Dr. Goodarz was promoted to Associate Professor of Global Health in the department of Global Health and Population. He holds a secondary appointment in the Department of Epidemiology and his research focuses on the impact of prevention policies and programs for cardiovascular diseases in low- and middle-income countries.

Alan Berkeley, Senior Grants Manager for the Department of Epidemiology was recognized with the ACE award which acknowledges commitment and excellence at the Harvard Chan School.
