# An innovative collaboration with King Abdulaziz University

Since 2008, Professor James Ware in the Biostatistics Department has led a collaboration with King Abdulaziz University (KAU) in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia to foster learning and research opportunities for Saudi public health and medical professionals. The current focus of that effort is a joint MPH in Epidemiology and Biostatistics, which will see its first cohort graduate in June 2015. Since the program began last fall, 13 HSPH faculty and students partnered with KAU faculty to run 12 courses. The courses utilized a flipped classroom and, primarily, a distance learning approach. From our own department, Fran Cook, Julie Buring, Megan Murray, Howard Sesso, Nadia Abuelezam, Ashkan Afshin, and I developed and taught courses in epidemiologic and research methods as well as infectious and chronic disease epidemiology.

As a teaching fellow, my involvement in this program allowed me to work closely with HSPH and KAU faculty to create course content, teach and mentor KAU students, and gain valuable experience in a different pedagogical model, the use of technology in the classroom, and teaching internationally. This collaboration further involved training the KAU faculty to assume increasing responsibility for the program, tackling big picture questions about what it is that makes a program succeed. This past spring, my experience was further enriched by two opportunities to travel to KAU with Julie Buring. Each of those two weeks essentially involved an epidemiology boot camp, tying together a year's worth of curriculum as the KAU students worked to finalize their thesis proposals and presentations. During our time on the ground, we witnessed exponential growth in the students' understanding and confidence. On a personal level, we were given unique access to a largely closed society and were overwhelmed by the hospitality of the Saudi students and faculty who arranged for a daily feast of regional food and welcomed us into their lives. While all of this was not without its challenges (travel tip: if offered lamb intestine, take small bites), I'm grateful to the school and our department for supporting initiatives like the joint MPH at King Abdulaziz University and look forward to welcoming the second cohort of KAU MPH students during this coming academic year.

• After founding the Program in Molecular and Genetic Epidemiology (now the Program in Genetic Epidemiology and Statistical Genetics or PGSG) and overseeing its rapid growth (it has more than doubled in number of faculty, staff and trainees over the last 10 years) Professor David Hunter has stepped down as PGSG director to focus on his duties as Dean for Academic Affairs. Professor Peter Kraft is the new PGSG Director. Professor Kraft was deputy director of the PGSG from 2010 to 2014

#### **Global Epidemiology**

Professor <u>Mathew Mimiaga</u> was awarded an <u>NIMH</u> Ro1 to continue his HIV prevention work in India and also an <u>NIMH</u> R34 to develop and pilot test a <u>PrEP</u> (truvada for prevention) demonstration trial and adherence intervention for transgender women in Lima, Peru.

#### Thinfluence

Professor Walter Willett has a new publication soon to be released to the general public called Thinfluence.
 The book discusses ground-breaking research pointing to external factors that contribute to weight issues such as social, environmental, and policy-based issues. It is written in collaboration with Malissa Wood and Dan Childs.

#### Charles J. Epstein Research Award

• Postdoctoral Fellow Po-Ru Loh has received a Charles J. Epstein Research Semifinalist Award for his presentation, "Efficient Bayesian mixed model analysis increases association power in large cohorts," which was selected for a platform talk at the 2014 American Society of Human Genetics Annual Meeting this October in San Diego. Several other PGSG members will also be presenting their work at this Fall's ASHG meeting; the full list can be found on the PGSG website.

#### **Cindy Wu's New Publications**

• Former PGSG postdoctoral fellow Chen (Cindy) Wu is the first author on a Nature Medicine paper studying pancreatic cancer, "Elevated circulating branched chain amino acids are an early event in pancreatic adenocarcinoma development" (2014 in press). Dr. Wu is also first author of large new meta-analysis of genome-wide association studies of esophageal cancer in Chinese populations: Wu et al. "Joint analysis of three genome-wide association studies of esophageal squamous cell carcinoma in Chinese populations," Nature Genetics, published online 17 August 2014. Dr. Wu started both of these projects while she was a postdoc at HSPH.
