TV viewing, exercise habits may significantly affect sperm count



A new study led by researchers at HSPH found that healthy young men who were sedentary, as measured by hours of TV viewing, had lower sperm counts than those who were the most physically active. *Read more*

Low vitamin D levels may increase risk of type 1 diabetes



Having adequate levels of vitamin D during young adulthood may reduce the risk of adult-onset type 1 diabetes by as much as 50%, according to HSPH researchers. The findings could lead to a role for vitamin D supplementation in preventing this serious disease in adults. *Read more*
