


Eating too much salt linked to heart-related deaths worldwide

The global taste for salt — seventy-five percent of the world's population consumes nearly double the daily recommended amount of sodium — may have been responsible for 2.3 million heart-related deaths in 2010.



Budget sequestration will hurt vital health care functions

Programs facing cuts include the National Institutes of Health, facing \$1.6 billion in cuts that will delay or halt vital scientific projects; and CDC programs that track infections and foodborne disease outbreaks.
