### HHI collaborates on George Clooneyfunded project to monitor Sudan



The <u>Harvard Humanitarian</u> <u>Initiative</u> is collaborating on a new human rights project initiated by George Clooney to monitor tension in Sudan surrounding the country's January 9 referendum on independence for oil-rich southern Sudan. In response

to fears that the event may spark civil war and humanitarian disaster, the <u>Satellite Sentinel Project</u> uses satellite imagery and crowd-sourced mapping to capture evidence of violence and possible threats to civilians in near real-time. <u>Read more</u>

## Lown Scholars Program and Visiting Professorship launched

A professorship and scholarship program to honor HSPH Professor *Emeritus* Bernard Lown's career was launched on November 5 with a Dean's Distinguished Lecture by the first Bernard Lown Visiting Professor of Cardiovascular Health Srinath Reddy. The program is dedicated to promoting teaching, research, and training with an emphasis on the global prevention of cardiovascular disease. Lown pioneered research on sudden cardiac death and developed the direct current defibrillator. He also co-founded International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War, which won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1985.
