Study finds care disparities at small rural hospitals



In the first national study to examine care at critical access hospitals (CAHs) in rural areas of the U.S., HSPH researchers found that CAHs have fewer clinical capabilities, lower quality of care, and worse patient outcomes

compared with other hospitals. The researchers found that patients admitted to a CAH for heart attack, congestive heart failure, or pneumonia were at greater risk of dying within 30 days than those at other hospitals. **Read more**

Nearly 350 million adults have diabetes, study finds



A major international study collating and analyzing worldwide data on diabetes since 1980 has found that the number of adults with the disease reached 347 million in 2008, more than double the number in 1980. The research,

published reveals that the prevalence of diabetes has risen or at best remained unchanged in virtually every part of the world over the last three decades.
