Common chemicals linked to lowered immune response to childhood vaccinations



A new study finds that perfluorinated compounds (PFCs), widely used in manufactured products such as nonstick cookware, waterproof clothing, and fast-food packaging, were associated with lowered immune response to vaccinations in children. It

is the first study to document how PFCs, which can be transferred to children prenatally (via the mother) and postnatally from exposure in the environment, can adversely affect vaccine response. *Read more*

Dietary changes before surgery may reduce risk of complications

Although it may seem counterintuitive, lead author James Mitchell, assistant professor of genetics and complex diseases at HSPH, said that "data indicate that the well-fed state is the one more susceptible to this kind of injury."
