Summer temperature variability may increase mortality risk for elderly with chronic disease



New research from HSPH suggests that seemingly small changes in summer temperature swings--as little as 1°C more than usual--may shorten life expectancy for elderly people with chronic medical

conditions, and could result in thousands of additional deaths each year. *Read more*

The likely culprit in sharp worldwide declines in honeybee colonies since 2006 is imidacloprid, one of the most widely used pesticides, according to a new study from HSPH. Pinpointing the cause of the
