




Advocacy




Differences between evaluating services and advocacy

Models of change and complexity: Advocacy is more like raising a child than following a recipe

Simple	Complicated	Complex
Following a recipe	Sending a rocket to the moon	Raising a child
Recipes are tested to assure easy replication	Sending one rocket to the moon increases assurance that the next will also be a success	Raising one child provides experience but is no guarantee of success with the next
The best recipes give good results every time	There is a high degree of certainty of outcome	Uncertainty of outcome remains





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Examples of Monitoring and Evaluation for Services & Advocacy





Questions for planning advocacy to influence service delivery outcomes

- . What clear and powerful short-term benefits are we aiming for?
- What are the strategically critical long-term benefits?
- How do these align with what can realistically be achieved with the available resources, capacity, and project timeframe?
- What benefits or results will be tangible and which will be intangible (or difficult to precisely measure with available resources)?
